Mary Seacole 1805-1881

Mary Seacole went to help soldiers in the Crimean War.



Nelson Mandela 1918-2013

Nelson Mandela was the first black South African President. He spent 27 years in prison for trying to change things so that they were equal for both black and white people.



Rosa Parks 1913-2005

One day on a bus, she refused to give her seat to a white person just because she was black. This led to changes being made so that black people no longer had to sit in a separate section on the bus



Alice Coachman 1923-2014

Alice Coachman was an African American athlete, who specialised in the high jump. In London in 1948 she became the first black woman to win an Olympic gold medal.
